

MUSC227 Fall 2016

Course Description and Goals

This course is an introduction to German diction (the fundamentals of phonetics and sound production as applied to singing and speaking German) with appropriate modifications for singing. The International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) will continue to be introduced and used. Class periods will consist of lecture and participatory components, with an emphasis on student participation in singing and speaking exercises and repertoire (Lieder, arias and recitatives). Assignments will include listening, reading, writing, practicing and preparing repertoire. Outside of class, the student will be expected to prepare assigned repertoire and to complete written assignments. By the end of this course, students can expect to be able to successfully address and solve German diction issues that they will face on the concert and operatic stage.

Course Expectations and Policies

Assignments

Students are expected to have read the appropriate, assigned materials **before** they are discussed in class. Written exercises, which will include basic translation and use of IPA, will periodically be assigned and will be due at the next class meeting. **Late written assignments will not be accepted.** Students will be assigned various arias, recitatives and/or songs that they are to sing at a specified time. Failure to be prepared or to perform at a high level on your assigned date will result in a greatly reduced grade for that day. The accumulative total of these performances equals 45% of the final grade and each performance will be graded.

Class Performances

- 1. Selections will be chosen by the professor with the approval of the studio teacher.
- 2. Students must be prepared for in-class coaching/performances on their assigned days. These pieces do not need to be memorized, but are expected to be as close to performance level as possible. This will be arranged by the middle of the semester. Rescheduling will only be permitted if the student presents a written excuse from a physician of his/her studio teacher. Failing to be present for a coaching/performance means a failing grade for the assignment.
- 3. A pianist will be provided for the students' in-class coaching and performances. Additional practice time with the class accompanist is limited. It is not the accompanist's responsibility to teach music to the students. While each student is performing or receiving individual in-class coaching on diction, all other students must actively and respectfully observe their colleagues' performances.
- 4. Evaluation of the performances will be based on preparation and improvement.
- 5. The final performance will be memorized.

Grading

Students are expected to actively participate in class discussion and to attend all class meetings. The final grade will be based on the quality of preparation and performances of assigned repertoire, written work, and class participation.

Written quizzes will be given periodically throughout the semester (no pop quizzes). There is a written midterm however there is no written final exam.
